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South Bend Meeting

A total of forty-eight papers were presented at the Annual Meeting in South Bend.

Dr. Margo Longo, first woman Regent of the College, presented an enlightening paper on Women in Medicine, followed by an extensive report from the College. She indicated that the College is a Federation; that the Governors represent the Fellows, bringing to the Board of Governors the concerns and problems Fellows face. Through the committees of the Governors the problems are discussed and studied with the Board of Governors making recommendations to the Board of Regents. The Board of Regents then acts, responding to the problem.

Dr. John Glover, giving the Twenty Fifth Shumacker Oration, talked on A Physiologic Approach to Vascular Surgery. He outlined three phases of Vascular Surgery, the first being the use of pressure and the ligature for hemostasis. The second phase is an anatomic phase, using reconstruction and prosthetics for treatment and arteriography for evaluation. He feels that we are presently in the third phase, where not all anatomic defects need repair, that physiologic assessment using duplex Doppler ultrasound evaluates function as well as anatomy. He also indicated that this physiologic evaluation is applicable to venous disease as well as arterial.

Four Resident Papers Given Awards

Fifteen resident papers were submitted and all were presented at the annual meeting. Ten were selected for the

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Jay Grossfeld to Chair American Board of Surgery

Jay Grossfeld, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Indiana University has been named Second Vice Chairman of the American Board of Surgery. This position leads to Vice Chairman and Chairman in the course of the next two years. Dr. Grossfeld has served on the American Board of Surgery for two terms and his second term expired this year. He is the first pediatric surgeon accorded this honor.

Turner Named President-Elect

William W. Turner, M.D., F.A.C.S. was elected President-Elect at the Annual Meeting of the Fellows in South Bend. Dr. Turner is Director of Surgery, Director of the Surgical Residency Program, and Chairman of the Surgery Section at Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis. He has served on the Council for three years and was Program Chairman for this year's meeting.

Re-elected to the Council for three years were Kirby R. Gross and John W. Oren. New Councilors are RoseMarie Jones and G. A. Rowe, both of Indianapolis.

Second Governor Selected

In April the College notified the Indiana Chapter that it was eligible to have a second Governor at Large. At the Councilors meeting in South Bend, Robert Inlow and James Madura were named nominee and alternate. The Nominating Committee of the Fellows will select the Governor at the Clinical Congress in October.

Meet your Chapter Officers - Governor Broadie

Thomas A. Broadie was born in St. Paul, Minnesota in 1941 and received the *Resident Appreciation Award for Outstanding Contribution to Resident Education* in 1995. Between those two singularly outstanding events, is a lifetime of devotion to excellence in academic medicine. He received an A.B. from Princeton in 1963, a B.S.M. from the University of South Dakota in 1965, and an M.D. from Northwestern in 1967 (AOA). His surgical training was with Owen Wangenstein at the University of Minnesota where he received a PhD in Surgery in 1977. He was with the Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, for two years, coming to Indiana University in 1978 as Assistant Professor of Surgery. He became Associate Professor in 1982 and Professor in 1992. He became Chief of Surgery at Wishard in 1984 after six months as Acting Chief, and serves in this capacity at present. He is the father of the Indiana Chapter A.C.S. as we presently know it. Treasurer and President he oversaw the complete restructuring of the Chapter to bring it into compliance with I.R.S. and A.C.S. guidelines. Hospital Merger Mania

In Central Indiana St. Vincent and Community Hospitals merged over a year ago. Methodist has formed the Methodist Health Group and is merging with University and Riley Hospitals. St. Francis Hospital (Beech Grove) is merging with St. Vincent-Community but has prompted an investigation by the Justice Department antitrust section. The investigation is to determine the size of the market, its location and what percentage of the market the merger would control. Supposedly a 40.9% share by the merger exceeds the 40% limit set by the Justice Department. Methodist has acquired the Bedford Regional Medical Center and has affiliations with Union Hospital, Terre Haute, Tipton Hospital, Tipton, and Howard Community Hospital, Kokomo. In Shelby

County, Major Hospital, the Affiliated Group and local physicians have formed a Limited Liability Corporation to offer care to area business. *What is going on in your part of the State?*



Managed Care - Follow-up

The Council discussed managed care at the meeting in South Bend. Discussion was lively and concerned but lack of information prevented arriving at conclusions. The Council felt that the Chapter should serve in an advisory capacity and should remain as an educational resource. A committee chaired by President Wellborn, and with Drs.
